Peter Pan Playschool

During the extended lunch sessions, the children were asking which bin to put their rubbish in – the general waste or recycling bin. To extend their learning, we started looking at the logos on the packaging to help them identify if items could be recycled. We decided to collect our crisp packets, both at playschool and at home, and then we went for a walk together to The Grange at No. 5 shop in the village to take our crisp packets to be recycled.

One of the children asked what the crisp packets were turned into, and the shop lady wasn't sure. So when we got back to playschool we used the computer to find the information. They are recycled by a company called Terracycle, and turned into a type of plastic which they use to make garden furniture. The children found this incredibly

fascinating. To extend the children's learning about our environment even further, we borrowed some litter picking equipment from Bookham Residents Association and went for our own litter pick walk to help keep the playschool grounds clean and tidy.

In line with Government guidance we had to close early due to the coronavirus outbreak, but we're still keeping in touch with our families via our Facebook page and online learning journals. Staff are sharing clips of them reading stories to the children, making pompoms, introducing their pets and lots of other things. We've also continued our weekly newsletter and shared ideas of activities parents can do at home with their children to help continue to support their learning and development and to support and promote



positive mental health.

Peter Pan Playschool is an inclusive setting, which cares for children from 2 years until school age. We offer weekday morning sessions 9.10-12.10 during term time, with optional extended hours until 1.10 and 2.40 on Monday, Thursday and Friday. At time of writing we had cancelled our planned activities for May. We hope to be able to hold our next open meeting, scheduled for Wednesday 19th August at 7.30pm at the St Nicolas Pastoral Centre. At our February meeting we enjoyed a talk on the subject of

forest gardening, which involves creating sustainable conditions for a low-maintenance garden. This proved popular and it was good to see some new faces.

We attended the second Environment Forum hosted by Mole Valley District Council – you may have seen an article about the Forum in

the Leatherhead Advertiser in March. The report on MVDC's carbon footprint is now available on www.molevalley.gov.uk (search for "carbon footprint", article "How we're tackling climate change").

We've also put the Plastic Free Bookham project on hold until such time as it is appropriate to restart it. Surfers Against Sewage, who run the accreditation scheme, are looking at how groups can continue to promote the scheme online. However we have made good progress on the groundwork for talking to our local organisations and businesses. We've held our first steering group meeting, and MVDC have provided us with minutes as evidence of their resolution to reduce single-use plastic. There is now a project website – www.plasticfreebookham.org.uk – on which you can find information about the

project objectives, alternatives to plastic and plastics recycling.

The underlying objective of the Transition movement is to create sustainable and resilient communities. Our local businesses that have been able to stay open in recent weeks have done a fantastic job of keeping the community supplied with essentials. Leisure Learning Current Affairs Classes

Leisure Learning has been running in Bookham for 13 years and we have had a very busy season with many different speakers talking about their own special subject which have included Europe (and inevitably Brexit), China, the US, climate change, Israel, social changes in the UK and drug problems in Surrey. We have heard some really stimulating lectures followed by entertaining discussions.

Before Christmas our long standing lecturer Jim Chrystie led the talks for seven weeks then in 2020 we held nine out of the planned 13 remaining lectures until mid March when our last four lectures were postponed until the autumn due to our decision to self-isolate ahead of the Government's official instruction.

Each of the 20 classes lasts two hours and there are identical sessions in Bookham on Thursday mornings and afternoons. There's no paperwork and you're in a comfortable environment listening to expert commentary on domestic and world events followed by a healthy exchange of views.

Because we run the courses ourselves, we have low overheads and so have been able to hold the cost for the 20 classes at £100 since we started 13 years ago. If you do join us, you will be assured of a warm welcome from existing members.

We had an exciting start to the year with one of our members, Gail Diprose, giving us an extremely inspiring talk on self-sufficiency and treating us to a wide range of produce she has grown and prepared herself. Little did we know how much we would draw on that knowledge and those ideas in the months that followed.

Our second talk was given by Simon Richards on Richmond Park and the Isabella Plantation. We have all known about Richmond Park, and some have walked or driven through it, but not known the layout details or history behind it. I certainly was not aware of the beautiful 40 acre garden inside the park known as the Isabella Plantation. This was planted in 1830 and first opened to the public in 1953. The emphasis is on colour with spectacular displays of rhododendrons, camellias and the National Collection of Azaleas collected by Ernest Wilson in 1920. The Plantation has been recently restored and is an organic haven for wildlife.

Then we all know what happened. Our programme, meetings and possibly even our Summer Show are on hold, but that does not mean gardening has stopped. Many of us are having far more time to garden in this beautiful spring weather and we are seeing so much activity. Gardens are looking so attractive and tended and I am sure there will be spectacular summer displays as we walk around our neighbourhoods. It is an opportunity to enjoy our homes and gardens, courtyards, balconies, windowsill gardens or houseplants and tackle those outstanding gardening jobs, prepare for summer planting, try new techniques, produce our own food and just stop and absorb our lovely surroundings.

This is a year for initiative. Get out those seeds and start sowing and pass excess seeds and seedlings around as there may well be shortages. Use any containers and sieved garden soil if you don't have compost or pots. Divide up your own plants to increase your

stock and tend whatever vegetables, herbs, fruit or flowers to get maximum production.

Pop in some quick vegetables for eating or try sprouting lentils, beans, sunflowers or pea shoots for salads. For those mums who want to encourage and be creative with kids, try growing carrot tops, watching beans grow, make a cress head or grow one of your potatoes.

The one luxury we have is time and this is the best season to use it in the garden. We will see when things return to normal and then we can resume our programme. Do continue to prepare for our show on the 11 July which will hopefully go ahead.



Howard of Effingham Star in a Spine Tingling Addams Family Show:



It seemed like a different world only a few weeks ago when the Howard of Effingham launched their annual school musical on the Leatherhead Theatre stage. Howard of Effingham's version of the Addams Family – coincidentally including a Friday 13th show – just escaped being cut off by government restrictions.

With a cast including members from Year 7s starring in their first shows (and some newcomers from other years) to Year 13s bowing out and all of the year groups in between, the Howard's Show is always inclusive, but never loses that characteristic quality. Bringing to life the dark, but often humorous, escapades of the titular Addams Family, the cast seemed perfect fits for their roles, expertly characterising every minute detail of how their characters would act.

With her characteristic musical skill, Ellie Humberstone (Wednesday) more than held her own taking on a slew of tricky female solos and duets and pulled everyone in the audience to their feet for standing ovations at

every show. Sophie Grainger brought all of the recognisable traits of Morticia to life in a stunning performance, maintaining composure, impeccable mannerisms and brilliant singing through all of the shows. Another departing cast member is Year 13's Zak Muggleton, who got one of the most recognisable parts in the show of Fester and played it to perfection. He brought the slightly breaking voice, the always overdone facial expressions and marvellous comic lines to life.

Gaining her first principal role, Ellie Cain (playing Pugsley) was given a potentially tricky character to play, as by casting her as Pugsley the directorial team gave her the challenge of mastering a male character for her song often a completely different vocal range. Ellie, however, was more than up to the challenge, wowing the audience at every show with her amazing solo, and perfectly punctuating her comic lines - definitely one to look out for in future Howard musicals. Rounding off the family - and how could anyone forget this amazing piece of acting - was Bella Grieve, playing the very soul and spirit of the family, Grandma Addams, giving perfect comedic effect to her lines and adding a new dimension to the show: although whose Grandma is she? We may never know... Also in his first musical was Jonar, sorry, Jonah, Webster, bringing to life – or perhaps undeath? – to the ghoulish butler Lurch. Whilst there wasn't always a lot of variation in Jonah's lines (it's hard to do that when all that's in the script is grunting) he somehow managed to create a convincing character from the ever dependable butler, even getting a chance to show off his brilliant singing voice in the final song.

Whilst the title of the musical is the Addams Family, there is also a very important second family – the Beinekes. This group of 'normal' people have to come to terms with the weird and wonderful world of the Addams Family after their son (Lucas – played by James Stevens) falls for Wednesday. James brought

Lucas to life fabulously, capturing the mannerisms and behaviour of a character stuck between trying to be Crazier than Wednesday whilst remaining true to his upbringing – not exactly the impulsive type. Sophie Storey was back again in a prominent role, this time as Alice Beineke, the reserved, poetic mother and wife – until her song that is. With such a difficult song – not made any easier by some unpredictable table stability. A counterpoint to his wife, Ewan Cretney wowed the audience as Mal Beineke – a slightly rigid and standoffish Ohioan who soon learns to come into his own as the second act progresses.

No Howard musical would be complete without the fabulous ensemble, who this year had the slightly different task of turning themselves into a full family tree of ancestors, taking costumes from throughout history, and prehistory in fact, to fulfil one of the most important roles in the show. Without our wonderful Ancestors, anything the main family did would be a little flat, the songs would lose some of their life and the show would be poorer for it, so whilst they do not always get the recognition they deserve.

On a personal level, I absolutely loved being a part of this musical. The chance to bring to life a recognisable musical character like Gomez Addams and have the chance to act and sing some of my newfound favourite lines and songs in musical theatre was one that I would not have missed for the world. As I won't get the chance to do this again, I would like to thank all of the staff who give up so much of their time to put together this musical, all of the members of the band and also the crew, both students and the fabulous people at the Leatherhead Theatre. It's a Happy/ Sad departure, but I am looking forward immensely to seeing what the Howard can get up to for next year's musical.

A brisk, 40 minute walk and talk, rain or shine on Bookham Common at 8am, so people like me can go and still get to work. Sometimes there are 10 or 11 of us, sometimes 4 or 5, and sometimes 2, but there is always someone and I never walk alone. That's probably the greatest underlying principle of Bookham Bees WI; whoever you are, whatever your age, whatever your interests, whatever time you have, be it a lot, or very little, there is always someone or something for everyone, and rest assured you will NEVER walk alone. At this time, more than anytime before, in this time of national and

worldwide need, our communities will never walk alone.

At St Lawrence Primary School, we face an unprecedented period in education with the partial closure of schools due to the coronavirus outbreak. Staff have demonstrated true dedication and determination in seeking ways to continue supporting our families as much as possible.

Teachers have been supplying individual class home learning plans on a weekly basis, so parents can help children to consolidate their subject knowledge and progress their



learning.

We have been able to support key worker and vulnerable families by remaining partially open for those children for most of the period to date. We hope to continue this provision in the coming weeks and months.

Many of our staff have continued working in school, with those in isolation working from home to provide additional learning support to families. It has been remarkable to see the staff team working so creatively together, finding solutions to effectively navigate the unchartered waters in which we find ourselves.

We have been touched by the numerous messages of thanks received from families for the learning support they have continued to receive. Head of school Tom Dell remains in regular touch with families, updating them on the current situation for school through our newsletter and via emails. The mental health of the children and their families has been at the forefront of decisions, alongside the safety of everyone in our school community.

We very much look forward to the day when we can once again open our doors to all of our St Lawrence families. In the meantime we have been heartened to see inspiring pictures sent in by parents, showing children enjoying the



home learning activities provided by school. Many families have also taken the opportunity created by an enforced slower pace of life to teach their children new skills.

Parents often refer affectionately to St Lawrence as being 'small but mighty'. Never has this felt more apt a motto to embody the sentiments and attitudes found within our school community from the children, their parents and our staff. We thank you all for your support.



15 Years of Leatherhead Youth Project



With everyone all across the UK currently doing their part to stay home and protect each other, it has presented a new challenge for LYP to continue youth work across Mole Valley. However, it has also opened up new opportunities. We are continuing many of our One-to-Ones, as they are very important in a time of uncertainty. Our Youth Workers are creating interactive activities online daily and we are all catching up on paperwork and networking!

In April 2020, we will be celebrating our 15th Birthday!!

The vision for LYP began in 2003 when three Leatherhead Churches and MVDC came together to provide much needed youth provision in North Leatherhead. In 2005 we opened our doors. Having converted AllSaints

Church into a state of the art youth centre. We employed our first Youth Worker and with a team of committed volunteers, we ran BFree Youth Café for the first time.

By 2008, LYP had 3 full time staff members and ran a range of projects including Freestyle - a residential trip full of activities for 50 local young people and Total Football – a weekly football club. Then in 2012 we became more involved in working with NEET (not in education, employment or training) young people, to help them gain qualifications and work experience.

In 2014, we launched our first social enterprise, Allsaints Coffee Shop. After years of dreaming about being able to employ young people who have the least opportunities, we were able to hire three young apprentices.

In 2015 we were awarded a Surrey County Council contract to deliver 121 mental health support across the borough. In our first year we delivered 350 hours of one-to-one support.

2016 was the year we launched in Bookham, in partnership with 3 Bookham churches. Starting in January 2017, BYouth opened as an after school drop in with games consoles, a pool table, sports and cooking. Our Bookham projects now also include, Explore, Girls and Lads, with dinner and small group work.



In 2017, we had a Royal Visit to Allsaints Coffee Shop from HRH The Earl of Wessex, Prince Edward.

Since then we have seen record numbers of young people at our projects! We look forward to celebrating our 15 years this year - starting with one youth worker and an empty building, to now having 9 staff delivering youth services to over 600 young people every year!

The present lack of activity enables us to look back to last September when 36 members enjoyed a trip to Northern Spain. Tours Secretary Judy Money reports that they

visited a delightful town called Santiliana del Mar established around a monastery and surrounded by an ensemble of 15th to 17th century golden stone houses. Later they explored a replica cave at the Altamira Museum.

On Day 2 members travellled to the Picos de Europa arriving at the small ancient town of Potes. They enjoyed a cable car trip to see the spectacular panoramic views of the Picos peaks and valleys. On day 3 time was spent in Cantabria's capital, Santander, before travelling to El Soplao Cave home to a spectacular and diverse array of formations. The final day began with a 60 minute cruise to admire Bilbao from a different perspective (see photo)

and a guided tour of the amazing Guggenheim Museum designed by the renowned American architect Frank O Gehry.

A tour of Western Sicily is planned for October visiting the Doric temple at Segasa, Erice and Trapani, the cathedral at Monreale and the Valley of Temples at Agrigento. A very full five day programme that is, of course, dependent on circumstances.

Day visits are planned to Herstmonceux Observatory in July, the Huguenot Museum in Rochester with a boat trip on the Medway for August and in October a chance to view the Home of the Surrealists at the house of Lee Miller and Roland Penrose, the parents of Anthony Penrose, The Boy who bit Picasso, who was due to explain this title at the cancelled March lecture.

The lecture programme is also subject to change/cancellation. The September lecture is the Bayeux Tapestry. Evelin Eaton presents

the historical, cultural and artistic aspects of the Tapestry, which provides a testimonial of people's lives in the late Viking age.

A particular area of enjoyment for our Heritage Volunteers is the conservation of the vestments and fabric at Guildford Cathedral. The fabrics are in many cases old as well as beautiful as the photo of Bookham Arts group working on a chasuble



in the Chapter House shows. We have been working together for more than five years and will be there for some time yet. Chairman Angela Stevens heads the group and the fortnightly sessions will resume as soon as the current restrictions are lifted.

Angela says numbers of the Arts Society here in Bookham are pleasing and attendances in January and February were good despite poor weather. The high standard of our lecturers is amazing for content and professionalism and this high standard is being put to the test while we are unable to meet. We go on the Arts web site to find live lectures. There is also a vast amount online and television for us to enjoy. We will not be meeting for a few months but look forward to normal service being resumed.

Future Mole Valley Draft Local Plan: BRA and Villagers Respond

Following a great team effort by the BRA, the IliveinBookham.com website team and a host of volunteers the BRA response to the Future Mole Valley Draft Local Plan Consultation was delivered to the Council on Monday 23 March.

In addition to the BRA submission, a campaign to encourage all in the village to respond individually to the consultation was also implemented during March with leaflets delivered to every household by BRA road stewards and volunteers; a website, yourbookham.com, was also set up which gave guidance on the submission process and topics such as the Green Belt and infrastructure that residents should consider when making their response. This guidance was well received by residents and a "thank you" goes to all Bookham residents and

interest groups who submitted their comments to the Future Mole Valley Consultation Draft Local Plan Consultation process which what was a very weighty and complex consultation document.

Mole Valley District Council will now take time to absorb ours and all the other responses and will then produce the next version of the Plan document under a regime known as Regulation 19. Again we should have the chance to comment and this will then finally go to the full Mole Valley District Council for agreement before being sent to a Government Planning Inspector for approval or otherwise.

The regulation 19 document should appear much later this year and the Inspector could take up to a year to do his or her job.

The MVDC Cabinet member responsible for Planning, Margaret Cooksey, has repeatedly said that this draft plan is not the one they finally expect to put forward. We will keep everyone in the village informed on what we find out as the months unfold.

BRA AGM Cancelled

Following the Social Distancing directive from the Government, we have cancelled the BRA AGM in May. Depending upon the COVID-19 circumstances we expect to hold the AGM in the autumn. We will advise once the Government guidance is clear.

How it works...


- 1. Call us on our freephone number $0800\ 3077\ 111$ and tell us how we can help.
