## All aboard Bookham Village Day

Bookham was swept away by the All at Sea Village Day Parade wave on 15th June. Local playgroups and school children had turned into jelly fish, mermaids, star fish, rainbow fish, sharks, sailors, scuba divers, whales and even a giant purple octopus!

First came Jason Wright in his vintage Austin 7 that could have been called the yellow submarine (following the theme), and the Steelonium Steel bands who drummed up a rhythm while the sea creatures chanted their own sailor songs. The Leatherhead (sea )Lions mascot also made an appearance and added to the music.

It was humbling to see that many of the school groups chose to promote the plastic pollution issues in our oceans; their costumes including swaddles of rubbish bearing signs of 'plastic never goes away' and 'swimming in plastic'. The parade down the High Street finished in the Old Barn Hall field in Church Road where the Band from the Pub was waiting with a lively rendering of 'We all live in a yellow submarine' as the judges decided which group had the best costumes and which were the best dressed stalls.

The prize for the best pre-school group went to the Rainbow Playgroup and runners- up were Bookham Toddler Group with their giant purple octopus. In the schools group the prize went to Polseden Lacey Infant School dressed as scuba divers. Runners-up were The Dawnay School sharks.

The cup for the best dressed stall went to Great Bookham Belles WI who very cleverly covered their canopy with rubbish. Runners-up were Bookham Bees WI with their coral reef design and blue tutus! Inside the Old Barn Hall the winners were Bookham, Fetcham & District Garden Society.

There were so many things to see and do thanks to over 50 stalls, many of them run by local organisations and charities such as the Grange, who sold a selection of delicious fudge, cards and mugs that were all skilfully hand-made by the people that go there.

Many people had a go on the surf simulator or Waverider that proved to be a lot trickier than it looked. A big thank you to Elios & Di Carlo's Hairdressing who provided it, and the Adventure+ climbing wall supported by John Wadsworth estate agents and Churches



Together. The Punch and Judy show and Bocketts Farm's were very popular; as was the novel Poopla game at the Guides stall.

In the arena the crowd was entertained with song and dance routines by Polesden Lacey, The Dawnay and Eastwick Infant schools, St Lawrence Musical theatre group. Action Theatre and the Dancing Roses belly dancers and the Natalie Goodacre Trio. The open-air bar served mouth-watering specialist real ales that could be enjoyed with a burger from the BBQ.

Despite a couple of short showers later in the afternoon, these did not dampen anyone's spirits as inside the Old Barn Hall there was also plenty to look at including Mole Valley Quilters who decorated the stage with their beautiful patchwork. Bookham Stamp Club presented a collection of historic photos of the area that were appreciated as were delicious cakes home made by Bookham Butterflies WI and all the refreshments served in the hall.

It was heart-warming to see young and old come together to celebrate the ties of our close knit community – with even a passing visit from the Red Arrows. As Louise Sutherland from Peter Pan Playschool said: "I think this year's theme really brought everyone together as the groups were largely similar but with a different twist and it really showed a united Bookham which was lovely to see."





### **Bookham Wine Club**



In my last report members were eagerly waiting to hear about the new style of wines being produced from

some of the younger Spanish wine-makers.

Accredited Rioja educator Pippa Hayward had chosen a wonderful selection of wines made from indigenous grape varieties grown in the north east (Catalunya) and the north west (Galicia) of the country. Oak ageing is out, and biodynamic techniques are in, as younger drinkers are opting for more interesting and locally-made "wines without make-up".

This was followed by presentations from Angela Bawtree ("Current trends in the world of wine"), Richard Bost ("A taste of modern Lebanon") and Irina Hriplivi ("What! Moldovan wines?"). All speakers provided us with some fascinating insights; starting with Angela, who highlighted the trend for greater sustainable production and shifts attributed to climate

change, while both Richard and Irina made claims for the oldest site of wine production in the world!

Looking a little further ahead into the summer, our programme includes 'visits' to Italy and Portugal and, back by popular demand, a summer event comprising a wine tasting of up to 25 wines, followed by hog roast and music. Held in co-operation with the Association of Wine Educators (AWE) and to be expertly hosted by locally-based wine communicator Heather Dougherty it promises to be another evening to remember.

### **Bookham Country Market**

#### Part of a 100 year old tradition



Bookham Country Market is part of Country Markets Limited which is celebrating 100 Years of Markets. Country Markets started in 1919 when a WI Market was set up in Lewes, East Sussex followed by more in East Kent, Berkshire and Buckinghamshire.

Progress has continued over the years:

 1932 saw the Carnegie Trust provide a grant that enabled model rules and a handbook to be written. Individual markets were registered under the Industrial and Provident Societies Act and organised into County Societies.

- 1972 first £1M annual turnover achieved
- 1982 COUNTRY MARKET was trademarked.
- 1990 NFWI became a Charitable Company Limited.
- 1992 saw a £10M annual turnover.
- 1995 separated from NFWI and adopted the name WI Country Markets Ltd.
- 2004 the use of the WI initials was discontinued to leave Country Markets Limited.
- 2013 the corporate device COUNTRY MARKETS COOK CRAFT GROW was trademarked.
- 2019 Country Markets celebrate 100 years of trading in England & Wales.

By the early Seventies the Surrey Society of Country Markets Ltd had 10 local markets operating including Dorking and Leatherhead (both now closed) and in September 1976 at a public meeting it was agreed that a Country Market should be established in Bookham. Many of the early members were Leatherhead producers who lived in Bookham and Fetcham.

Bookham Country Market duly opened in the Old Barn Hall on Friday October 1st 1976 and held its first Annual Meeting in March 1977. Mollie Snow, one of those who attended that first meeting was able to come and cut the celebration cake at our 40TH Anniversary in 2016 along with other founder members (see picture). By this time Bookham Country Market had established itself as one of the biggest weekly Markets in Surrey.



### **Bookham and Fetcham Gardeners Association**

In 1955 some Eastwick Allotment tenants started buying lime in bulk. Over the years this developed into the Bookham and Fetcham Gardeners Association selling much of what is needed for every day gardening. Yes we were previously known as Eastwick Allotments and Gardens Association but the name led local people to think you couldn't visit our shop on Eastwick Allotments unless you had an allotment which is NOT the case. The majority of our members don't have an allotment but are gardeners who pop in on a Sunday morning between 10am and midday to stock up on just about anything they need for their green oasis.

It costs just £3 to be a member and in real terms the membership has not increased at all in the last 64 years. You will certainly save the membership fee even on your first purchase. We are also happy to give anyone the 'benefit' of our gardening advice

Here are some tips on seed germination and growing rhubarb.

#### **Seed Germination**

Provided you always use fresh seed successful germination is dependent on two vital factors - heat and moisture. As this is difficult to achieve by sowing directly into the ground, one cheap and cheerful solution after sowing and watering is to cover the rows with plastic

guttering. Remove the covering after germination, lift the covering to water in high temperatures and watch out for slugs on the inside of the guttering.

Another option is to sow seeds in small biodegradable pots. We use peat pots in a normal size seed tray. Place in a heated propagator or somewhere warm like an airing cupboard. It is advisable to put several seeds in each pot and retain the strongest seedling.

This system speeds up germination and pots can be spaced in the ground correctly. It can be used for many types of seeds and is especially useful for vegetables and flowers that dislike being transplanted. Water well both when sowing the seeds and planting the pots in the ground.

#### Rhubarb

Rhubarb is a great option for the first-time gardener. It is easy to grow and suffers from few pests or diseases. It benefits hugely from generous amounts of well-rotted compost, but dislikes very hot weather so a fertile, partly shaded environment is ideal. In the growing season, and to maintain a regular supply of edible pink stems, keep it well watered.

Unusually rhubarb benefits from cold and frosty weather during its dormant period from October to March. Divide the crown

frequently anything from three to every five to six years. Dig out the crown over the winter, divide the root with a spade into sections which must include a large bud or eye then leave the unprotected crowns on the surface. After giving away surplus crowns, plant the remainder in late February/March surrounded by rotted manure. Do not plant too deep, remove any flower stems and in the first year after division do not harvest.

For an extra early crop, try forcing the plant as this produces sweeter and tenderer stalks. Cover the plant with a container or large pot to exclude light as soon as growth starts on the bud or eye. You can also bring the chilled crowns into a cool greenhouse in November, pot them up with compost and cover with black polythene. Rhubarb will be ready to eat in around four weeks.

When harvesting twist and pull the stems from the base: do not cut. Discard the toxic leaves and do not harvest after early July to allow the plant to rebuild its energies. The most common variety to grow on allotments is Victoria but Timperley Early is also popular as the earliest provider which is also good for forcing.

How things have changed! Today, 95% of the UK has access to the internet. We carry around

a Coffee Shop based in Bookham Baptist Church three times a week on Monday, Friday and Saturday mornings. We offer great coffee, cakes freshly made by the residents at The Grange; and a listening ear, as well as signposting to local help services.

The Meeting Place also runs a Language Hub for those whose first language is not English. Our Tuesday morning group has grown considerably in recent months, and we would like to expand it. If you were interested in gaining an ESOL qualification (or maybe you already have one), please get in touch for an informal discussion about getting involved.

We have also launched a lip-reading course for people affected by hearing loss which will resume in September. They are taught by a professional Lip-reading tutor, and the cost is subsidised by The Meeting Place.





After winning this year's Village Week Quiz, we realised that many people do not know who we are or what we do. Anyone would be forgiven for looking at the name and wondering why women would need or want to be 'registered'.

NWR is a charity with groups across the UK that connect women who are interested in everything and talk about anything! We meet

in each other's homes for lively discussions, to share ideas, meet other women, and make new friends. We are primarily a women's discussion group, with the emphasis on participation, though we do have occasional visiting speakers, visits to local places of interest, and social events to which partners are invited. There are also nationally organised events, an annual conference, a magazine, website and Facebook page. Anyone is welcome to join, though group size is limited by the number of chairs that will fit in the average sitting room.

NWR started in 1960 as the National Housewives Register (NHR) to provide a forum for women, mostly those who had to give up work to start a family, and give them a place to meet and talk, away from domestic topics and responsibilities. Although many more women now return to work after starting a family, NWR continues to provide a stimulating

environment and a chance to meet other local women with similar tastes and interests.

NWR is not political, religious, judgemental or a pressure group, nor do we campaign or fund raise. Some of our recent meetings include a visit to Jo Downs glass at Ripley to learn the techniques of glass fusion, a talk from the Epsom and Ewell food bank, a Polish evening with food, drink and information about the country, and a discussion on gender issues with thought-provoking video interviews.

The Society's next event will be the annual seminar at the Old Barn Hall on Saturday



### **Leatherhead & District Local History Society**



Visitors have once again been calling in at Hampton Cottage, the 17th century land mark in Church Street, Leatherhead to learn about their local heritage following the first structural refurbishment since it opened as

Leatherhead Museum nearly 40 years ago.

The cottage is a small timber-framed house, built between 1649 and 1682. When it was purchased by the local history society in December 1976, most of the ground floor external timber had deteriorated but upstairs the original timbers had survived. The whole building was suspended on jacks while footings were dug out and all the outer walls underpinned. The museum opened officially in October 1980. However, by this year it was time to replace the upper timbers too and from February to May a contractor experienced in working on historic buildings

completed the job. Mole Valley Council was involved at all stages as Hampton Cottage is a listed building.

The museum reopened for the 2019 season 9 May and BBC Radio Surrey presenter Allison Ferns dropped by at the end of the month to report this year's two special Craft Days for children. She interviewed volunteers helping youngsters in the garden and also actors dressed as historical characters. Her chat show starts at noon every Monday to Thursday and the visit can be heard on the BBC website.

Extra exhibition space is being made available this summer to display paintings by Anthony Hill, the well known Leatherhead artist. The museum is open every Thursday and Friday afternoon from 1pm-4pm and from 10am-4pm on Saturday plus10am-4pm on Sunday, 22 September during Heritage Open Days.

Separately at the Letherhead Institute, the history society will recommence its Friday lectures from 20 September with a double offering of News letter Editor Tony Matthews speaking on *The Contrasting Owners of Cherkley Court* at 2pm and lan Betts of the Museum of London Archaeology talking about Georgian Baths and Bathing Practices from 7.30pm.

On 18 October Professor Pat Wiltshire will talk on *The British Hedgerow-Past and Present* and on 15 November, Jane Lewis of Surrey History Centre will cover the bizarre lengths people have gone to in order to enhance their beauty and appear fashionable in Fashion and Folly. 
